NEW SPACES AT VICTORIA AVENUE EAST CAMPUS SUPPORT

Continued Growth

Renovations at Assiniboine Community College's Victoria Avenue East campus in 2021 saw a few new spaces born:

- The Centre for Adult Learning opened as a result of the relocation of the former Adult Collegiate.
- A new Centre for Creative Media was constructed, home to three new creative media programs.
- The movement of other areas allowed Assiniboine International to come together in one renovated space.

"In 2016, we welcomed an offer from the provincial government to put unused space at our Victoria Avenue East campus to use," said Mark Frison, president at Assiniboine. "This has allowed us to better serve learners, industry, and the community during a time of immense growth."



Assiniboine's growth strategy resulted in a 58 per cent increase in the number of graduates from 2013 to 2020. The college's strategic direction has a stated goal of 2,028 graduates by 2028.

"Bringing our Adult Collegiate into the fold at the Victoria Avenue East campus will allow us to collocate services for students, allowing adult learners to access the full range of supports easily in one place," said Kate Pelletier, former Dean of Trades and Access Programs, who was in the role at the time of the move.

Innovative new learning spaces are now home to three new creative media programs—Digital Art and Design; Media and Communications; and Web and Interactive Development—inside a 10,050-square-foot facility. Construction on both the Adult Collegiate relocation and Centre for Creative Media projects was completed in 2021, with both welcoming students in fall 2021.

"New and enhanced learning spaces mean greater opportunities for students to access post-secondary education in in-demand fields of interest," said Wayne Ewasko, who was the Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Immigration in March 2021 when several MLAs and ministers came to campus to tour the projects in progress.

"Economic growth in Manitoba relies on post-secondary programs that align with the labour market and building industry partnerships that inform this alignment,"

said Ewasko, now the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Learning.

These rejuvenation and expansion projects follow on the heels of other renovations the college has undertaken in the past several years including the Public Safety Training Centre (2016), Food Processing Centre (2019) and Assiniboine Early Learning Centre (2019). The renovations are expected to cost approximately \$6 million and will be funded using the college's financial reserves.

"These investments into the Victoria Avenue East campus are supporting programming that is meeting the labour market needs in the Westman region," said Reg Helwer, Minister of Labour, Consumer Protection and Government Services and MLA for Brandon West. "We will continue to work collaboratively with our institutions to further support student success."

Official opening events will be scheduled for each of the new spaces in 2022.

In March 2021, the Ministers of Education (Cullen), Advanced Education and Immigration (Ewasko) and Central Services (Helwer), along with the Brandon East MLA (Isleifson) visited campus to see the construction in progress for the spaces that have now been completed.

Great Grey Owl pivots with pandemic

During a year like no other, the 33rd Great Grey Owl, held in February 2021, transitioned into a new format due to the COVID-19 global pandemic.

The new format kept the event within the public health orders of the time while allowing students to have the 'learn by doing' experience that ensures students receive credible, live experience that fulfills curriculum requirements and is directly transferrable to industry jobs.

Great Grey Owl also did not want to compete with the restaurant sector, which faced its own challenges as a result of the pandemic. For this reason, clientele was restricted to the college community (staff, students, alumni, donors). The restaurant operated as a 'ghost kitchen', partnering with the Feastify app for patrons to place delivery or pick-up orders.

Culinary Arts students and faculty designed a tantalizing menu to reflect the theme of Global Street Food in a small-plate style. Wines and beverages, bags, cutlery, and service technologies were carefully selected and managed by Hotel and Restaurant Management students.

True to the college's Field To Fork philosophy, many of the vegetables used were grown in the historic vegetable garden at the North Hill campus.

In addition to serving up delicious meals, the programs made a concerted effort to ensure that most of the bags and packaging materials used were biodegradable or recyclable locally here in Brandon, with further steps taken to include food liners in containers to prevent grease stains which might prevent recyclability.





APPLIED RESEARCH

Assiniboine's faculty researchers made considerable strides this year to make advancements in their respective areas of expertise. Projects to strengthen food security and build healthy, sustainable and strong communities were made possible thanks to various funding partners.

The pursuit to manage white mould in Manitoba's dry beans benefited from matching funding from the Canadian Agricultural Partnership and the Manitoba Pulse & Soybean Growers for a total of \$83,700 toward the project led by Dr. Baljeet Singh (top right).

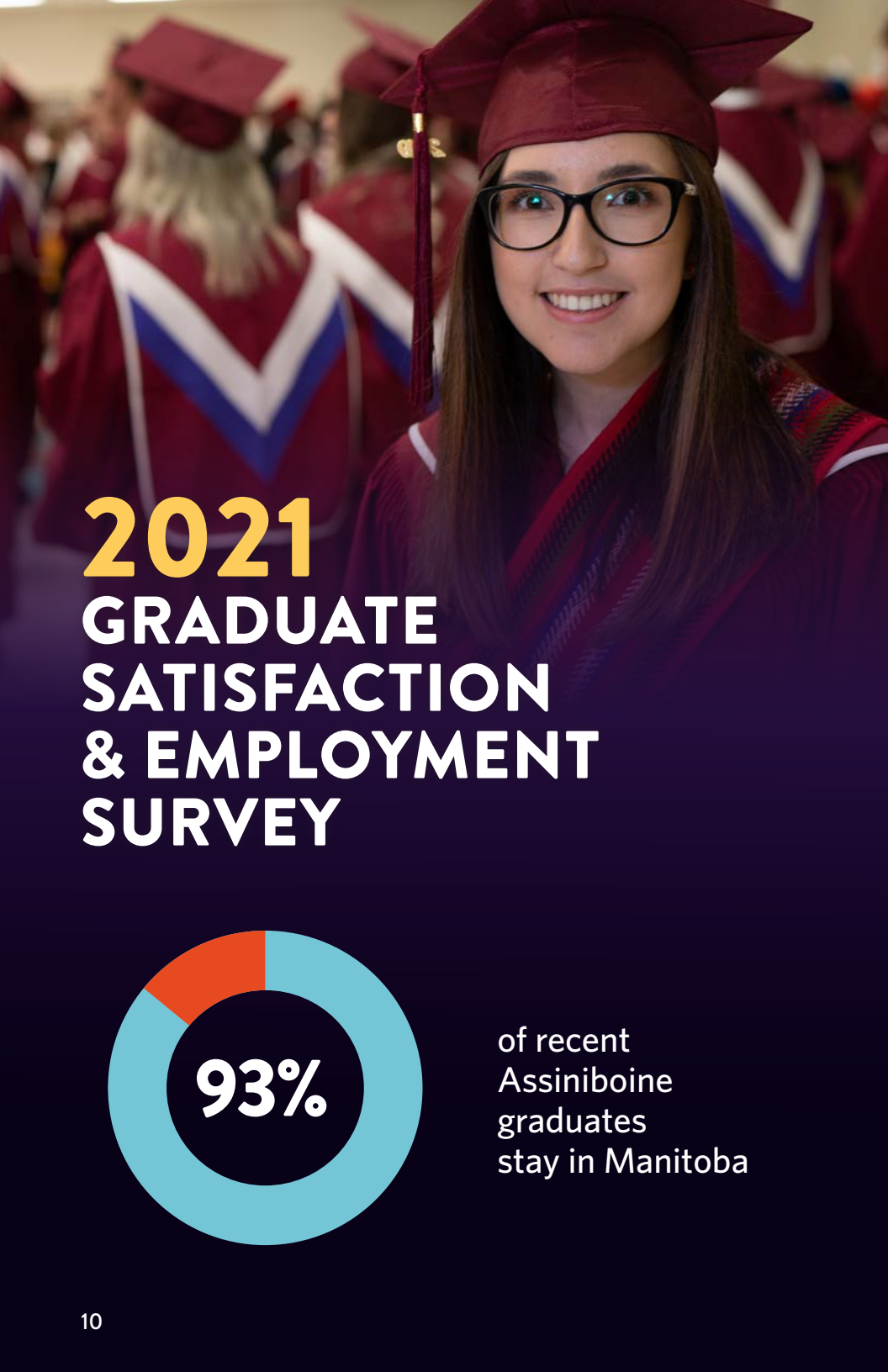
A multi-year sweet potato research project that aims to identify commercial sweet potato varieties for Manitoba's climate received a \$25,000 bump from the Natural Sciences Engineering Research Council (NSERC). The project, led by Dr. Sajjad Rao (middle right), was able to pursue the final step, commercial production, with this support.

Another Assiniboine led research project, with Dr. Poonam Singh (bottom right) at the helm, also received \$25,000 in funding from NSERC. The project's focus is to find a growing media to replace peat, ultimately lowering the environmental impact of ornamental crop production.

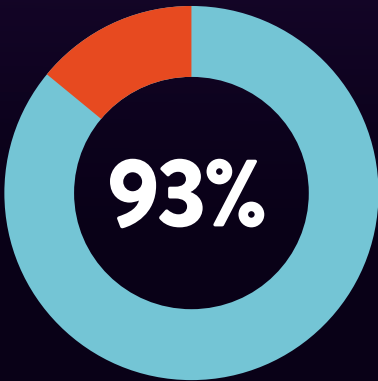

2021 GRADUATE SATISFACTION & EMPLOYMENT SURVEY

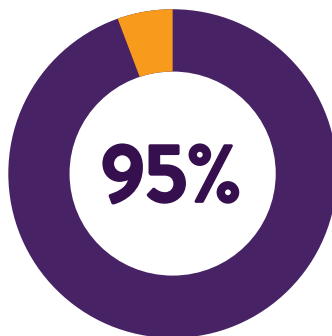

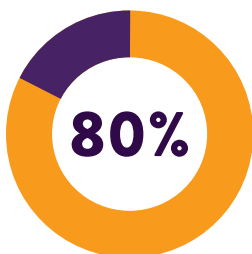

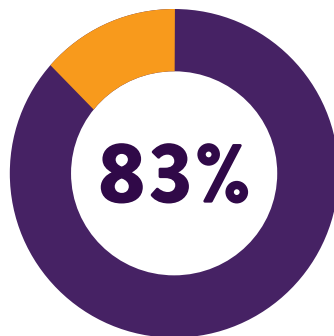

PRAIRIE INNOVATION CENTRE

Manitoba's Ag College continues work to build new, leading-edge agricultural training centre.

Assiniboine Community College has offered agriculture programming for the past several decades, and a renewed focus has the college investing even bigger in agriculture. Applied research, program alignment to industry needs and the introduction of the Prairie Innovation Centre will contribute to the college's plan for enrolment in ag programs to nearly triple over the coming years.

The Prairie Innovation Centre is the cornerstone of the future in agriculture-related training at the college. This \$65 million capital project includes a \$15 million fundraising campaign. Since the campaign launched with a \$1 million donation from Sunrise Credit Union in fall 2020, the Centre has received \$11 million in commitments—a number that continues to grow.

"Together with Assiniboine, we share a commitment to making our community a better place to live and learn, and at Wawanesa Insurance, we know all of the Westman region will benefit from the new Centre," said Kevin Bailey, Regional Vice President - Central Region, Wawanesa Insurance. The college announced Wawanesa's \$100,000

contribution to the project in spring 2021.

This one-of-a-kind Canadian college project will bring together collaborative learning spaces, applied research labs and multipurpose spaces that will serve both industry and the college community.

"The Prairie Innovation Centre will not only address the current and developing gaps in the labour market in Manitoba agriculture, it will also be a hub for agricultural innovation, encouraging engagement and collaboration with industry partners to address emerging situations and issues," said Derrick Turner, Director of Advancement and External Relations at Assiniboine.

"The college looks forward to building upon the relationships we have with partners while creating a meaningful impact on the future of agriculture."

A key motivator behind the need for the Centre is a growing gap in the agriculture labour market. In Manitoba, it's projected that one in five agriculture jobs will go unfilled by 2029.

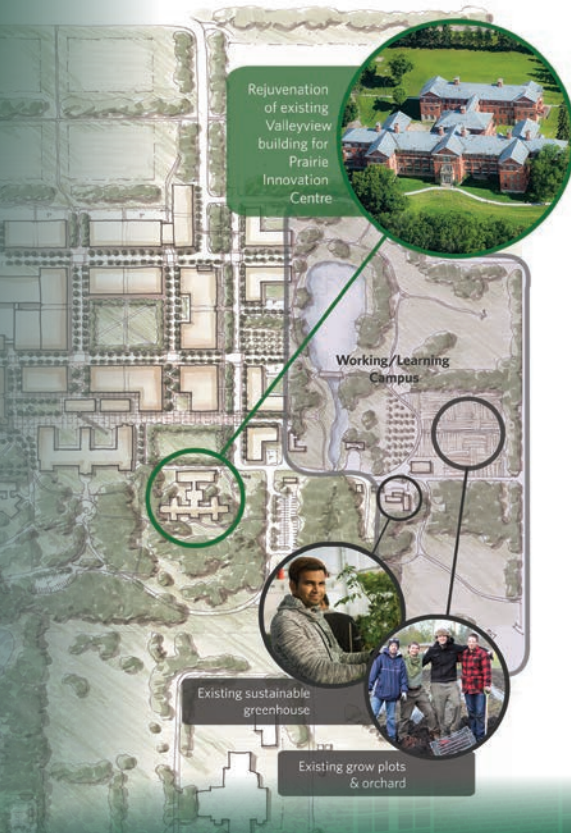
"Human resources are the most difficult piece, but also the backbone of a business like mine," said Bob Mazer,

president and CEO of Mazergroup, who is also an honorary co-chair of the Prairie Innovation Centre campaign. Mazergroup has committed \$500,000 to the project.

“Most Mazergroup employees have some link to Assiniboine, and that’s a big reason why we decided to contribute to the Prairie Innovation Centre project. Dozens of our staff have made better lives for themselves and their families because of the training and education they received at Assiniboine.”

And that’s really the purpose of the Centre—to ensure both students and the agriculture industry are set for success.

“Our college has a critical role in ensuring there are people trained and ready to step into careers in the growing agriculture sector,” said Mark Frison, president of Assiniboine. “The Prairie Innovation Centre will answer the call, arming agriculture in Manitoba with a skilled labour force.”

The Centre, which aims to expand seats in agriculture-related programming from 300 to more than 800, will repurpose the Valleyview Building on the North Hill campus.

"I think it's a great expansion, and it makes sense for the Westman area. Increasing local graduates in agriculture programs, that's great for everyone, not just our business," said Ron Helwer, president of Shur Gro Farm Services. "When majority of grads get jobs and stay in the province, that's important."

Helwer, who is an honorary co-chair and donated \$500,000 to the project, is

referencing Assiniboine's 2021 graduate survey that revealed 92 per cent of Assiniboine graduates were employed after nine months and 93 per cent stayed in Manitoba.

By creating an enhanced agricultural training capacity, the Centre will enable the agriculture sector to reach its full potential as an economic driver in the Canadian and Manitoban economy.

The Prairie Innovation Centre is Assiniboine's natural next step as a national leader in agricultural training.

They say charity begins at home. That's certainly the case when it comes to Assiniboine staff.

On Giving Tuesday (December 1, 2021) Assiniboine celebrated the generosity of their staff in donating to student financial aid and various projects at the college.

Over the past five years, nearly 200 Assiniboine employees have donated to the college through the Assiniboine Foundation. That has meant close to \$250,000 in donations.

"Our staff give a lot to the college through their dedication and efforts at work. It is amazing to see so many go above and beyond and choose to support our students and development with their personal resources as well. It makes me proud to work here." added Mark Frison, president of Assiniboine.

To mark Giving Tuesday 2021, Assiniboine president Mark Frison and his wife Edith are directing \$50,000 of their giving to the Assiniboine Foundation toward the college's proposed Prairie Innovation Centre for Sustainable Agriculture.

The Prairie Innovation Centre will be a hub for teaching & learning, applied research, and industry engagement. It will increase training for agricultural and environment sectors where one in five jobs are expected to go unfilled by 2029.

"As someone who works with the agricultural sector and the farming community, I know how important skilled and talented people are to business success," said Edith Frison, CPA-CA, who works as a tax specialist. "It's an easy project to get behind."

The Frisons have donated to several initiatives at the college including the Building on Demand Campaign, Growing the Greenhouse, Simulation Mannequins and scholarships since moving to Brandon in 2010.

"Assiniboine staff have been extremely generous in their support of students and college initiatives," said Heather Dodds, chair of the Assiniboine Foundation. "Every donation, big and small, helps the Foundation to support students in their journey toward a high-quality education."

ASSINIBOINE DELIVERS NEW, TUITION-FREE AG EQUIPMENT OPERATOR PROGRAM

The Agriculture Equipment Operator program, funded by Congress of Aboriginal Peoples, will provide a foundation for students who wish to pursue careers in a rapidly changing and dynamic agricultural sector focused on primary production.

“This partnership is an important step in helping to meet an industry need and in providing learners, who may otherwise not have had the opportunity, with a chance to enrol in a program that offers a gateway to great job potential,” said Kevin Poirier, Dean, School of Trades at Assiniboine. “I’m pleased to welcome the support of CAP to help ensure that there are trained people who can step into areas of need so that the growing agricultural sector can reach its full potential.”

The 14-week program, open to Indigenous people living off-reserve, started in February 2022 at the college’s North Hill campus.

“The Congress of Aboriginal Peoples’ Indigenous Skills and Employment Training (ISET) Program is a proud sponsor of Assiniboine’s Agricultural Equipment Operator (AEO) Program. A key objective of the ISET program is to provide skills training to off-reserve Indigenous people that address gaps in the labour market,” said Sarah Mitchell, National Project Coordinator with CAP.

“Projected labour market shortages in this sector overall are significant, and CAP is happy to support an industry that is in need of

skilled workers. CAP wishes every client in the AEO program the best of luck and a long and fulfilling career!”

The program began with a one-week preparatory course and ended with an 80-hour paid work placement. Students training with skilled staff from Assiniboine learned safe farming practices and the operational skills necessary to manage multiple enterprises found on Canadian farms.

“Producers across Manitoba are facing serious labour challenges and struggle to hire employees with the necessary skills to work on a farm,” said Keystone Agricultural Producers (KAP) president Bill Campbell. “The Agricultural Equipment Operator program will train participants with the knowledge and skills they need to be successful. KAP was pleased to help develop the program and provide industry input to align the curriculum with agricultural labour needs.”

Students will graduate with an industry-recognized credential.

“Removing the cost of training, a significant obstacle to employment, allows students to gain the skills and knowledge required for entry into the job market, without worrying about funding,” said Assiniboine’s Director, Indigenous Education, Kris Desjarlais. “With this, learners are free to focus on their training in this hands-on learning environment.”



RECORD \$600K IN STUDENT FINANCIAL SUPPORT

When Assiniboine distributed most of its student financial awards for the 2021/22 academic year, the final count was more than \$600,000. This record-breaking sum is \$150,000 more than the previous academic year and the largest disbursement of student awards in college history.

"This is a magnificent milestone, and something that has the power to create and enhance possibilities for many Assiniboine students," said Derrick Turner, Director, Advancement & External Relations at Assiniboine. "The goal of our fundraising is always to enhance the student experience. Whether it's learning tools and facilities or student financial awards, our efforts are student-focussed."

"This record, we hope, is the first of many to come. We're incredibly grateful, as are the students, for the phenomenal community support we receive to make this possible."

Awards distributed from this record amount will help close to 300 students pursuing training at Assiniboine this year. Financial awards are given to students based on a variety of indicators, including financial need, academic performance, athletic participation and emergency needs.

"As a community member and employer of current and future alumni, we know the value

of helping students to focus on their college experience with less stress about funding that experience," said Tyler Porter, Human Resources Leader with Koch Fertilizer Canada ULC, which has sponsored financial awards since 2010 and currently provides four \$2,500 entrance awards.

"Not only do we see the importance of student success every day in our business operations, but also in the community at large. We're proud to work with Assiniboine to add some positivity to students' lives."

Assiniboine's college community has a long history of giving to support student needs. Along with new and existing award sponsors like Koch Fertilizer Canada, the college's Funding Futures campaign connects with staff and alumni, and raised close to \$90,000 from 2017 to 2020.

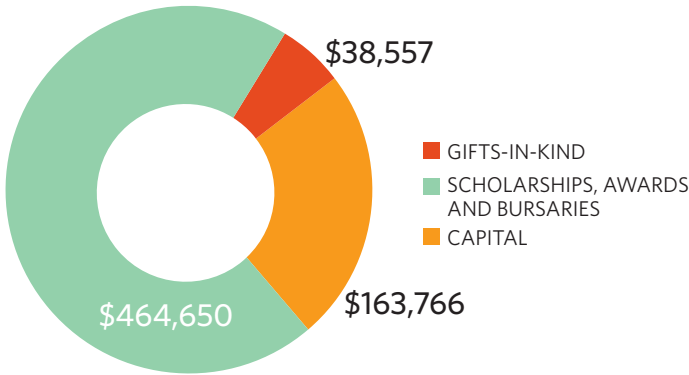

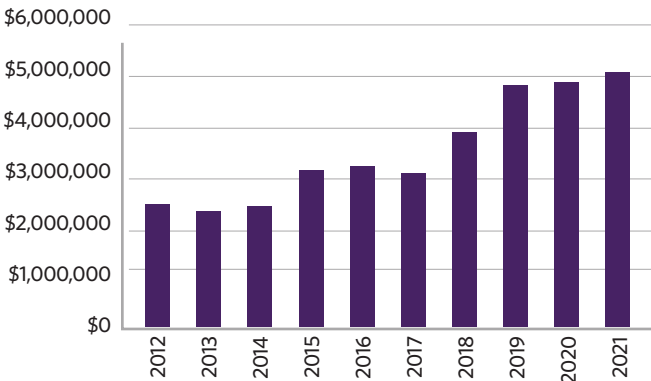
TOTAL DONATIONS RECEIVED

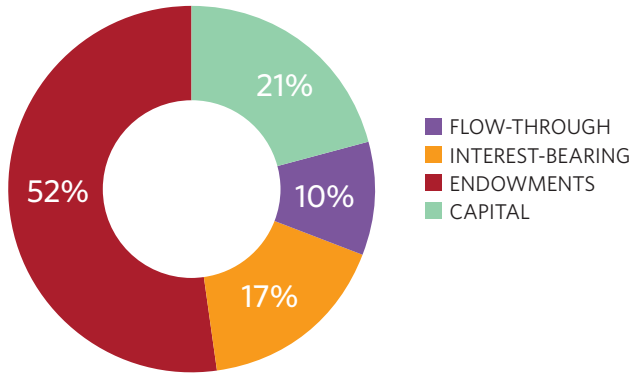
**2020/21 TOTAL
DISBURSEMENTS: \$666,973**



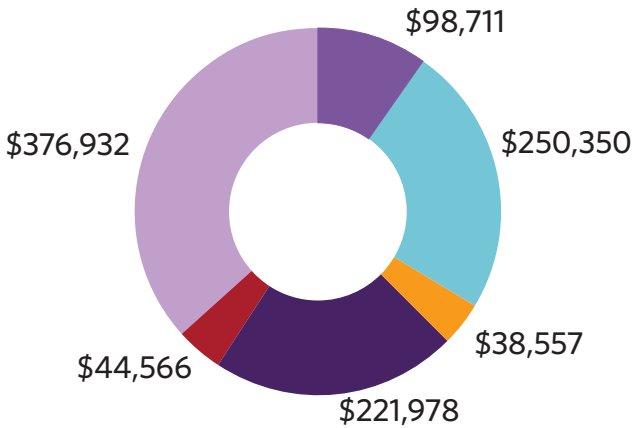
NET ASSETS HELD BY ACC FOUNDATION

Funding Futures is Assiniboine's annual fundraising campaign that encourages the alumni and extended college community to contribute to the success of current students—future alumni. And he did. In 2020, Aminian donated \$10,000 for the annual Funding Futures campaign.

"Since ACC played an important role in where I am now, I thought this way I can show my gratitude and appreciation," he said of his generous donation.

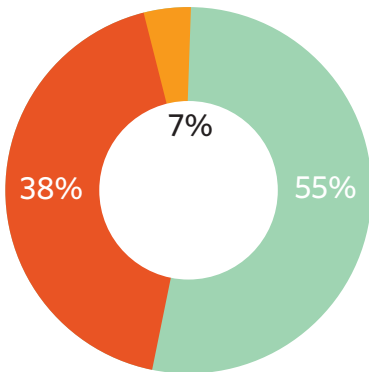

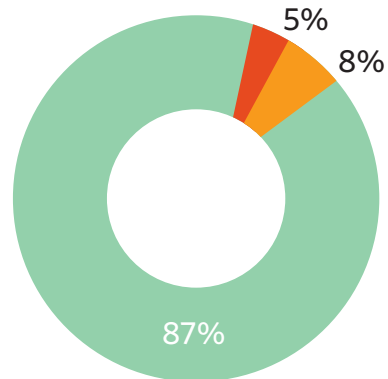

Athletic Awards

Assiniboine Community College has raised \$53,000 for Cougars Athletics this year, through the support of sponsors, donors, volunteers, and the Cougars Classic golf tournament. These funds will support Cougars Athletics and participating student-athletes through financial awards.

“In my experience, the college community has always been so supportive of one another, and particularly of students,” said Jayden Lamb, Assiniboine alumnus and co-chair of the Cougars Classic golf tournament. “It was great to be part of this and see it up close at the 2021 golf tournament.”

The tournament is a key fundraiser to provide student-athletes with financial support to complete their educational goals while enhancing their learning experience through team sport and competition. COVID-19 forced the cancellation of the 2020 Cougars Classic and the shutdown of much of the Cougars activity for the 2020/21 academic year.

“We’re looking forward to being in a place where we can watch our talented and determined student athletes flourish on the pitch, ice and court again,” said Lindsay McLaughlin, Athletics Manager at Assiniboine. “This sort of fundraising goes a long way to support and encourage our athletes. It’s a big year, with hope for a resumption of play across all of our sports, and this community support is a significant contributor to our programs.”

The 6th annual Cougars Classic golf tournament presented by Corcelettes Estate Winery was held August 12, 2021 at the Shilo Country Club, with a sold-out slate of golfers and sponsors. The event is hosted by the Alumni Association and Foundation, in partnership with Cougars Athletics.

PROVINCIAL INVESTMENT INCREASES NURSING SEATS

Assiniboine has received additional funding for three rural rotating sites (25 seats each), and an expansion of our existing Practical Nursing program in Portage la Prairie, which will enable us to welcome 35 learners each year, instead of every other year.

“These additional nursing seats at Assiniboine Community College are integral in furthering our Skills, Talent and Knowledge Strategy to ensure people have more access to post-secondary education in Manitoba in sectors with high labour demand, like health care,” said Hon. Jon Reyes, Minister of Advance Education, Skills and Immigration. “Assiniboine’s rural rotating nursing sites are an important contributor to the province’s goal of increasing nursing seats in the coming year.”

The demand for Assiniboine nursing graduates continues to be high; 100 per cent of practical nursing graduates surveyed from the 2019-20 academic year said they had jobs, making on average more than \$53,000 a year.

“Working with the province, the regional health authorities and the communities to deliver these rural rotating programs is an important part of our work to ensure we’re training nurses where they’re needed,” said Mark Frison, President at Assiniboine. “The demand for nurses continues to be high. Offering rural rotating nursing sites helps to address the need for skilled graduates in all regions of the province.”
