

How to Add LinkedIn Learning Videos to Your Moodle Course

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PURPOSE

This job aid will guide you through the steps to embed LinkedIn Learning videos directly into your Moodle course page. These videos can support students' learning by providing engaging, real-world, and expert-led content.

ABOUT LINKEDIN LEARNING

LinkedIn Learning offers short, high-quality instructional videos led by industry experts. Topics range from technology and software to communication, leadership, and job-readiness skills. These resources can help students gain practical skills aligned with program outcomes and workplace demands.

Instructors can use LinkedIn Learning to enhance course content, offer flexible ways for students to engage with material, and reflect diverse learning preferences and needs.

HOW TO EMBED LINKEDIN LEARNING VIDEOS IN MOODLE

Step-by-step instructions:

- 1. Open your Moodle course and click "Turn editing on."
- 2. In the section where you'd like to add the video, click "Add an activity or resource."
- 3. Choose "External tool."
- 4. Under Preconfigured tool, select "LinkedIn Learning."
- 5. Click "Select content." This will open the LinkedIn Learning video library in a new window.

 *Note: If your browser reports it is unable to open the "Select Content" window, switch your browser to Microsoft Edge or Chrome.
- 6. Search for the video or playlist you want to include.
- 7. Click "Add" to select your video or playlist.



- 8. Scroll down and click "Confirm."
- 9. Enter a title for your video (e.g., "Design Thinking Video Week 2").
- 10. Click "Save and display."

Your LinkedIn Learning video will now appear directly on your Moodle course page.

TIPS FOR INCLUSIVE AND ENGAGING USE OF VIDEO

Use a variety of learning materials

Supporting diverse learners means offering multiple ways to access content. Try to include more than just text or video. When using LinkedIn Learning, combine videos with interactive or reflective activities.

Examples of learning materials to include:

- Videos (LinkedIn Learning, YouTube, TED Talks, Khan Academy)
- Articles (from open access journals, industry publications, or experts in the field)
- Open Educational Resources (OERs) and textbooks
- Audio content (such as podcasts or interviews)
- Your own custom-created resources (e.g., slides, mini-lectures, diagrams).

Encourage active engagement

After students watch a video, deepen their learning with an activity. For example:

- Ask students to post a reflection in a discussion forum
- Create a short quiz or knowledge check
- Pair the video with a hands-on task or case study
- Facilitate a group conversation or brainstorming activity.

Make content accessible for all students

- Always check that videos have captions or transcripts
- Offer text alternatives or summaries
- Give students choice in how they engage (e.g., watch a video or read an article covering similar content).
